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- 1. (5 MARKS) Design a regular expression α over $\{0,1\}$ that defines the language over $\{0,1\}$ of all the strings of **Odd length**.
 - Clearly justify why your regular expression works as stated (**NOT** by example; give a "general argument" or a "proof" if you prefer (although a proof is **not** required in this problem)).
- 2. (5 MARKS) Build an NFA that accepts precisely all the strings over $\{0,1\}$ of length ≥ 2 that contain at least one 1 among their last 2 symbols. You must argue that your design is correct. Again, **NOT** by example.
- **3.** (5 MARKS) Convert to NFA (both over $\{0,1\}$) without comment:
 - 01(0+1)*10
 - $(0+1)^+101$
- **4.** (**4 MARKS**) Convert <u>without comments</u> each of the immediately previous two NFA (problem #3) to a FA.
- **5.** (**5 MARKS**) Prove that the following is <u>not</u> a regular language: Over $\{0,1\}$: The set $\{0^n10^{2n}: n \geq 0\}$

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
